# Our Board Chair and Executive Director

What an exciting year this past year has been! We are pleased to share with community some of the highlights of the past twelve months.

Our new transitional housing building officially opened in April 2024, and in the past year we have housed 25 women and their children, as they exit situations of violence. We have been able to support these families in their healing journeys and helped some quickly move on to permanent, safe, and secure housing. Others continue to be supported by our team until they feel ready to take their next steps. It has been so joyful to hear the laughter of children in the halls and to hear from tenants that the opportunity to be safely housed has changed their lives. We are grateful to our referring partners for their continued support - North End Women's Centre, Ikwe Widdjiitiwin, Willow Place, End Homelessness Winnipeg





(Naatamooskakowin), Tunngasugit Inc., and North Point Douglas Women's Centre.

We launched an exciting new program called the Purple Kitchen, which works with community members to build their knowledge around nutrition, gain new culinary skills, and complete their Food Handler's certificate, to help them gain employment. The program has been a huge success and we are excited for the next round to begin.

Our staff continue to do vital and life-saving work in housing, outreach, gender-based violence, family supports, settlement services, and supporting people to meet their basic needs. The needs in our community continue to grow and agencies like ours continue to be stretched as we do our best to support our community members.

We are grateful to our incredible funders and donors who support this work, especially as families everywhere struggle more to make ends meet. None of this would be possible without you!

We want to thank our wonderful group of volunteers who are committed to giving back to their community. You truly help make our centre feel like home for so many. And to our outstanding board members, thank you for your guidance and for sharing your

knowledge with us, to strengthen the work that we do.

We are privileged to walk alongside families whose courage and care

inspire us daily. From Indigenous families grounding their children in ancestral wisdom, to refugee families rebuilding their lives with hope and determination. From 2SLGBTQIA+ families creating safe, affirming homes, to single parents navigating life's challenges with grace—we witness the beauty and power of connection in all its forms. We've stood with extended families

sharing responsibilities across generations, and with families of choice who remind us that love—not biology—is the foundation of belonging. These families are the threads that make our community strong, vibrant, and whole.

This year, as trans and gender diverse communities face escalating hostility across North America, our commitment to these families has only deepened. The attacks on trans rights are not just political—they are deeply personal. They affect families trying to protect and affirm their loved ones, often while navigating systems that weren't built with them in mind. And yet, these families continue to show extraordinary resilience, courage, and love. We are proud to be part of a movement that refuses to be silent. We continue to learn from the trans community, to advocate fiercely, and to create spaces where every family can live with safety, dignity, and freedom.

Our programs reflect this inclusive vision. Pam, our Family Support Worker, has helped parents reunite with their children and prevent separation. Halima and Haidee, our Settlement Workers, have supported hundreds of newcomer families as they build new lives in Canada. Our transitional housing program has sheltered 25 families escaping violence, with

wraparound support from our GBV Workers, Rebecca and Amasiles, Tenant Support Worker, Mayran, and Property Manager, Jessica—helping them heal and rebuild.

At the heart of our work is a simple truth: we are stronger together. Our team doesn't just work side by side—we show up for each other like family. In a sector where the work is personal and the challenges are great, we lift each other up, share our burdens, and celebrate our wins together. This spirit of unity extends beyond our walls. Across the non-profit community, we see collaboration, solidarity, and shared purpose—organizations coming together like an extended family, working toward a future where every family can thrive.

As you read through this report, we hope you feel the heartbeat of our work. Families are the fabric of our community—and in every thread, we see love that refuses to break, courage that rises in the face of adversity, and hope that dares to imagine a better world. Together, we carry these stories forward, weaving a future where every family is held, heard, and empowered to thrive.

# Pam Mulhall

My name is Pam Mulhall, and I am from Winnipeg, Manitoba. I am the Family Support Worker at West Central Women's Resource Centre, and have worked with WCWRC since May 2021. Prior to this time, I had heard about the Centre's valuable support services and the workshops it offers from working in the sector for several years. The community's positive remarks and the reputation for providing helpful support truly resonated with me, drawing me to contribute to the important work of WCWRC.

Here at WCWRC, I work as a lifeline, reaching out to offer support and guidance to parents who are navigating the complex systems involved with Child and Family Services (CFS). I understand that these situations can feel daunting and isolating. So, that is where I come in, to be that lifeline of support through the often-overwhelming legal process of the CFS system.

I use mediation and advocacy skills to build a respectful, constructive relationships between parents and CFS. I work closely with parents to help break down their case plans into manageable, achievable steps. This approach not only clarifies what needs to be done but also demonstrates that progress is possible! Reducing the stress for parents helps foster confidence in my ability to meet their goals.

It is encouraging to see parents who have been successfully reunited with their children, whether through their return home or by establishing meaningful

relationships through supervised visits. I understand the challenges the parents may face when dealing with CFS, and I want to assure them that they are not alone. I think of myself as the parent's cheerleader—here to encourage and empower them to do what is needed to bring their children back home.

There are many challenges in this work, but not every day is hard. Most days there is always something that happens to remind me of the reasons I keep going. Working alongside amazing colleagues has truly made a difference: their kindness and humor often make me laugh and look forward to the next day. This work has been a rewarding experience to contribute to an organization that makes such a meaningful difference and see real life examples of how I as an individual can make a real impact in the lives of the parents I support.



# Parenting Programs

### Group Programs for Parents

Our parenting programs offer safe, supportive spaces for connection, learning, and empowerment. Through group sessions and one-on-one support, parents gain tools to navigate challenges and build stronger futures for their families.

**The Empowering Parents Program** is facilitated by our
Family Support Worker. This
program helps parents and caregivers understand and navigate the



Child and Family Services system, manage stress, build healthy relationships, and work toward reunification with their children. One-on-one support is also available to parents and caregivers to work on their CFS case plan stepby-step, until they are ready to bring their children back home.

Indigenous Parenting Program is facilitated by our Cultural Support Worker. This program shares traditional teachings through Elders and Knowledge Keepers, fostering cultural pride, balance, and a deeper understanding of family roles and values. Parents often finish the program with a strong interest in continuing their learning and are excited to pass on these teachings to their own children.

### **The Newcomer Parenting**

Program is facilitated by one of our Settlement Workers and is sometimes offered in collaboration with partner agencies. Topics include cultural adaptation, parenting in a new place, understanding Child & Family Services, gender-based violence and its impact on adults and children, self-care and the importance of mental health and wellness. Many mothers share that they feel more equipped to support their families through the many changes they face in their settlement journey.

### **Childminding Services**

Offering childminding services ensures that parents are able to engage fully in the programs and supports available to them. Childminding is offered during group programs, workshops, and one-on-one appointments—giving caregivers the freedom to focus, connect, and breathe, knowing their children are safe and cared

for. From drop-in childminding at our Centre to in-house childminding at our transitional housing building, these services create space for rest, healing, and growth.

### **Tenant Support Worker**

Opening our transitional housing building in the spring of 2024 offered new opportunities for direct family support, as WCWRC is now home for 16 families at a time. Within a few months of opening, a tenant support worker was hired to nurture relationships with the tenants, build bridges to other services offered by our team and foster a sense of community among the tenants. Over the past year these families have participated in monthly tenant meetings, art and storytelling programs, money management workshops,

sharing circles, and met with various staff to navigate the systems involved in their lives.

Across all programs, when parents join, a powerful theme emerges: the relief of knowing they're not alone. Whether navigating complex systems, reconnecting with culture, or adjusting to a new life, they find comfort in shared experiences and support.

# HEALTH OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT (HOCS)

Health Outreach and Community Support (HOCS) has been a vital partner in WCWRC's efforts to support women and gender-di-

verse individuals facing housing instability. Their holistic team includes clinical coordinators, trauma workers, and outreach staff, bringing expertise in social work, nursing, occupational therapy, and mental health to collaboratively address the complex needs of our participants.

The words of one of our housing staff helps encapsulate this:

"We meet weekly as a team to talk through the challenges and barriers we encounter in our work, and it's often during these times that complex situations arise where we need additional support. Meeting with HOCS each month has become an incredibly valuable part of our process. Sometimes they offer the simplest suggestion that completely shifts our perspective. Their knowledge, openness, and willingness to share, even from their own lived experience, makes them personable, trustworthy, and non-judgmental. It's this approach that helps us grow in our roles and feel supported in the work we do."

Through clinical consultation, direct service, care planning and staff training, HOCS has played a key role in improving access to housing, health, and social supports. Their ongoing commitment to trauma-informed, personcentered care has significantly strengthened our capacity to serve the community. We are honored to recognize HOCS with this year's People of Distinction Award.





### Financial Report

In 2024-25, WCWRC's transitional housing opened its doors for tenants. Fach of the 16 units were fully furnished and outfitted with all the housewares a family might need. The units were quickly filled and the sounds of little ones echoed through the hallways as almost 25 kids and their moms moved in.

When the building became operational, we began to amortize it as an asset. The building, which cost just over 10M, has now been amortized over 25 years. We also began amortizing the related deferred contribution for the building - which are all the donations and grants received for this project. At year-end, the assets value is \$299,736.

Day to day operations and maintenance of the building are covered by rent and supplemented by CMHB. The wrap around support services that WCWRC provides for all tenants are funded by the Province of Manitoba.
